3.1 Infrastructure Digitalization

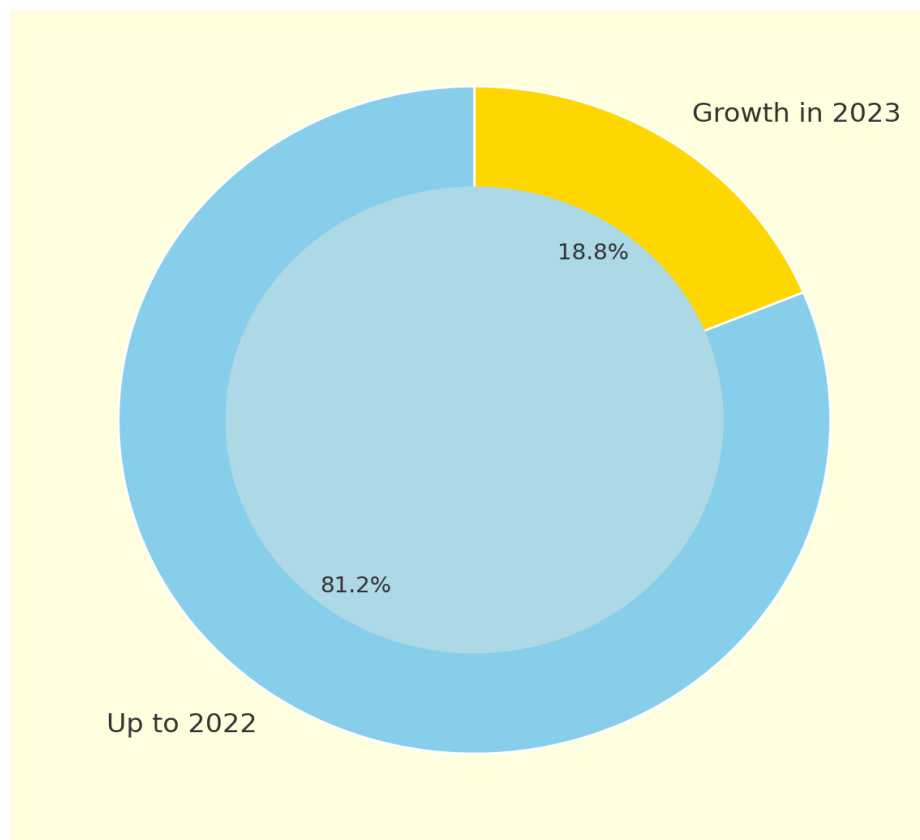

- National digital library frameworks with local language support

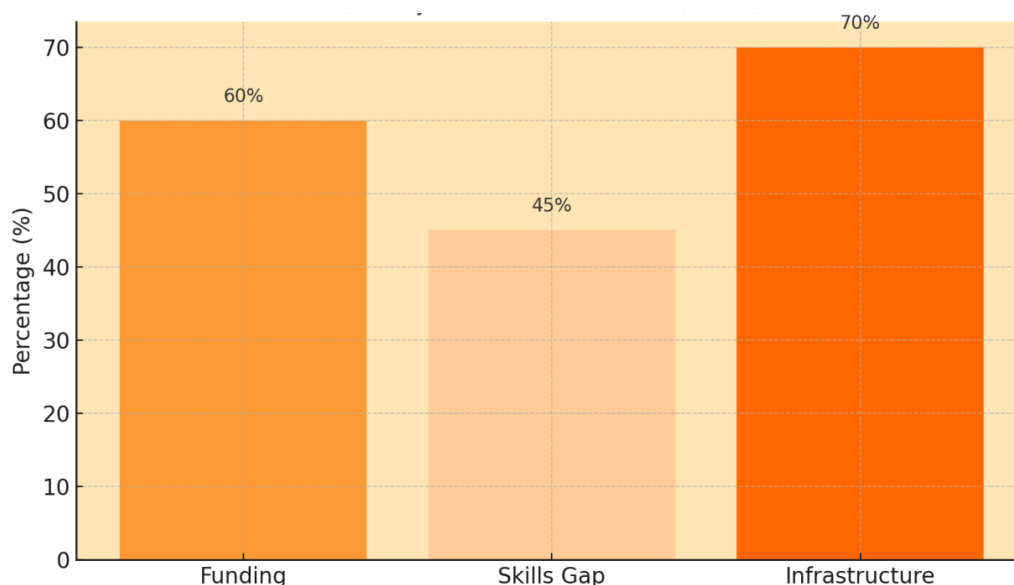


Figure 2: Barriers to Digital Transformation (Survey of 100 libraries in Asia, 2022)
